

St Philip's P.E. and School Sport Premium Funding Report: 2015/2016

What is the P.E. and school sport premium funding?

In April 2013, the Government announced new funding of £150 million for physical education (PE) and sport, with the proviso that it must be used to improve the quality and breadth of PE and School Sport provision. This funding has been allocated directly to primary schools, providing them with a dedicated resource to increase PE and School Sport Provision.

Each school now receives £8000 and £5 per pupil each year to be used solely on PE and sport. This funding was initially introduced for 2 years, but has now been extended until the end of the 2015/2016 academic year, with the potential for it to be extended further until 2020.

Consequently, since the beginning of the Summer Term in 2013, at St Philip's we have been looking at our already very good PE and School Sport provision and how this can be improved even further with the aid of this new funding.

Aims

- To provide the children with high quality levels of teaching in PE across the school.
- To increase the participation in competitive and non-competitive physical activity.
- To allow the children to develop physically, mentally and spiritually through physical education.

Spending:

Total PE premium grant (including that carried forward: £10850)

- 1) PE specialist advisory consultancy and staff development for the 2015-2016 academic year.

Total - £8800

Impact - A well developed and resourced PE curriculum, increased participation in competitive sports, high quality teaching and improved confidence from teachers when planning and delivering PE.

- 2) Before school multi-skills sports club for both KS1 and KS2

Total - £800

Impact - Higher participation in sporting activities, children have the chance to develop a range of skills and it gives children a better start to their day. Teachers are more confident and are able to deliver better quality PE lessons.

3) Equipment and resources has been updated to fit the needs in the curriculum.

Total - £1100

Impact - Lessons are no longer hindered by lack of equipment.

4) Competitive Alliance inter-school sports tournaments and internal school tournaments - Arranged by Alliance Secondary School - PE specialists.

Total - £1700

Impact - Increased participation and application of skills within a range of sporting competitions including football, netball, tag rugby, hockey and cross country.
